

DR. LEONARD FALCONE 1899-1985

The most consummate performing artists are able to expand the horizons of their instruments and set the standard for their generation. A subset of this group (a small number indeed) possess the pedagogical skills to match their artistic talents. These individuals are the true leaders of the music education world, maintaining extraordinary artistic standards while touching the lives of countless young people.

Such was the case with Leonard Falcone, who served on the faculty of Michigan State University for some 53 years. Dr. Falcone was one of those rare talents who combined remarkable artistic talent with natural pedagogical instinct.

Born in Roseto-Valfortore, Italy, in 1899, Dr. Falcone was a professional musician before emigrating to America at the age of 15. In 1927, he was appointed Director of Bands at Michigan State University, where he concurrently was Chairman of the Winds and Brass Department and Professor of Baritone Horn. Dr. Falcone was truly a world-class brass player, and his reputation for excellence touched all aspects of his career. His solo performances, his bands, and his students were all characterized by his singular dedication to the highest standards.

Dr. Falcone retired as Director of Bands at MSU in 1967. In recognition of his distinguished career, the University awarded Dr. Falcone the Doctor of Fine Arts degree in 1978. He retained his position as Professor of Baritone Horn until his death in 1985.

Dr. Falcone was active in the program of Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp since its 1966 birth. As a guest conductor and Honorary Trustee, Dr. Falcone helped Blue Lake become, according to former Michigan Governor William Milliken, "one of the state's greatest cultural assets."

It was in honor of his exemplary musical and educational accomplishments that a number of Falcone students, in cooperation with Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp, established the Leonard Falcone International Euphonium Festival (now Euphonium and Tuba Festival). The Festival has become a continuing testimony to Dr. Falcone's profound influence upon the lives of his students and the extraordinary artistry he achieved on the instrument he loved.

ABOUT THE LEONARD FALCONE INTERNATIONAL EUPHONIUM AND TUBA FESTIVAL

The Leonard Falcone International Euphonium and Tuba Festival has gained recognition as the premier event of its kind. The Festival was born in 1986 as a competition for both student and artist level euphonium performers. The event evolved into a true festival in 1991, when its sponsoring committee expanded its offerings to include lessons, ensembles, seminars, and clinics with some of the world's greatest euphonium virtuosi. The sponsoring committee expanded the festival offerings in 1996 to include a full range of festival activities for tuba.

The Festival's objectives include:

- promoting the highest level of artistry on the euphonium and tuba;
- encouraging young musicians to study the euphonium and tuba;
- enhancing the repertoire for the euphonium and tuba by commissioning and encouraging original compositions, transcriptions, and arrangements;
- presenting master classes and performances by distinguished euphonium and tuba artists at Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp; and
- fostering an increased awareness and appreciation for the euphonium and tuba by the general public.

Student and artist level competitions remain integral to the Festival. The competition has a truly international flavor, with contestants coming from countries around the world. In its first twenty-three years, over \$173,000 in prize money has been awarded.

Criteria for Festival Competition Participation

ARTIST LEVEL competition participants may be of any sex, race, or nationality but must not be full-time professionals (euphonium, trombone, or tuba) in either a performance position or a college teaching position. There is no age limitation.

STUDENT LEVEL competition participants must not have reached their 20th birthday by December 1 of the festival year.

The yearly competition cash prizes for the six euphonium competition winners and the six tuba competition winners total \$10,900.

The competition cash prizes are underwritten by foundations, companies, and friends who believe in the values of the Festival. Velvet Brown is professor of tuba and euphonium at the Pennsylvania State University and the brass area coordinator. Prior to joining the faculty at Penn State in 2003, she taught at Bowling Green State University (Ohio), Ball State University (Indiana), and served as an associate director of University Bands at Boston University. Currently Ms. Brown is a member of the ITEA Board of Directors and has served as the secretary of the Executive Committee for the International Tuba and Euphonium Association (2001-2007). She is also a board member of the International Women's Brass Conference. Ms. Brown is noted for receiving the 1999-2000 William Fulbright Fellowship Vinciguerra Award. She has had many successful students who have won prestigious playing and teaching positions as well as prizewinners at various regional, national and international competitions

Velvet Brown also enjoys a professional career as an international soloist and chamber ensemble performer, recording artist, conductor and orchestral player. She has made regular appearances throughout Italy, Switzerland, Austria, Germany, Finland, France, England, Hungary, Slovenia, Russia, Japan, Canada, and the United States. Ms. Brown is currently the principal tubist of the Altoona Symphony Orchestra and the New Hampshire Music Festival Orchestra. She has served as principal tuba with the River City Brass Band, and as substitute or additional tubist with the Detroit Symphony, Saint Louis Symphony, San Francisco Women's Philharmonic Orchestra, and the Fort Wayne Philharmonic. In 2004, Brown joined Howard Johnson's "Gravity" Tuba Jazz Ensemble as lead tuba. She has also garnered high praise as a founding and current member of the Monarch Brass Quintet and Brass Ensemble, the Junction Tuba Quartet, and the Pennsylvania Brassworks (Faculty Brass at Penn State). She has released three solo CDs on the Crystal Records label, and a CD for the Nicolai Music Label. Velvet Brown can also be heard on Albany Records in her interpretation of John Williams' Tuba Concerto. Velvet Brown is a Meinl Weston Performing Artist performing on the MW 2182 F tuba and the MW 2000 C tuba.

JUN OKADA is an internationally sought-after professional pianist. She enjoys an active career, being involved in over one hundred performances annually as a soloist, in duo ensembles, and as a chamber music specialist. She has received critical acclaim for her expertise in the performance of low-brass and woodwind string literature. Native of Hiroshima, Japan, she began her musical studies at Yamaha Music School and she received the bachelor and master degrees from Michigan State University under the tutelage of Deborah Moriarty.

MARY JO COX received her bachelor of music from Houghton College and her master of music and doctor of musical arts in piano performance from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. A student of Frank Weinstock and C. Nolan Huizenga, she also studied harpsichord with Eiji Hashimoto. She has performed in master classes for Lillian Kallir, Jeffrey Kahane, Arthur Haas, and Menahem Pressler, among others. She currently holds the position of principal keyboardist with the Midland Symphony Orchestra and is a frequent accompanist for festivals and competitions throughout the United States.

SHERYL IOTT is a frequent solo and collaborative performer throughout Michigan, and is currently on the piano faculty at Interlochen Arts Camp and at Grand Rapids Community College. MARIE BLAIR holds a Bachelor of Music from Michigan State University, a master of music from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, and a prestigious professional performance diploma from Royal Northern College of Music in England. She won the 2002 Bach Prize and the 2002 Piano Duo Prize. She has a keen interest in collaborative playing both as a duo partner and in chamber groups such as the chamber ensemble Helix 7. As soloist and collaborative artist, she has played concerts in the Midwest and the UK.

2009 FALCONE FESTIVAL ADJUDICATORS

THOMAS BROKA has recently retired as the coordinator of music for the Bay City Michigan Public Schools. He also taught at Brighton Area Schools and at Haslett Public Schools. A graduate of Central Michigan University and Michigan State University, he serves as vice president of the Falcone Festival. Active as a euphonium performer, he performs with several community bands and is a member of the Brass Band of Battle Creek.

MONTY BURCH Dwight (Monty) Burch joined the Grand Rapids Symphony as principal tuba in 1978. Previously he held similar positions in the Oak Park and Elmhurst Symphonies in suburban Chicago. Mr. Burch received a bachelor degree in music from North Texas State University and a master degree from California State University in Fresno. Principal teachers include the late Arnold Jacobs of the Chicago Symphony, Roger Bobo of the Los Angeles Philharmonic, David Kuehn, and James Winter.

As soloist, Mr. Burch has appeared with the Grand Rapids Symphony on its Casual Classics, Lollipops, and Recital Series. He has performed as an extra with the Chicago Symphony and the Fresno Philharmonic and in 1976 was awarded the Yamaha International Young Artist Award.

DAVID CLEVELAND is currently the director of instrumental music at Grosse Pointe North High School in Grosse Pointe, Michigan, and is entering his 20th year of teaching. He received his undergraduate degree from Michigan State University and master degree from University of Akron. Prior to his tenure at North High School, he taught on the faculties of Grosse Pointe South High School, The College of Wooster, The University of Michigan—Flint, and Imlay City Community Schools. He has spent many summers teaching at Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp and serves as a board member and adjudicator for the Leonard Falcone International Euphonium and Tuba Festival. He served on the executive board of the Michigan Music Educators Association.

DR. MARK COX is professor of tuba and euphonium at Central Michigan University and holds BM and DMA degrees in performance from Eastman and an MM in performance from Northwestern. Dr. Cox has performed with numerous professional organizations, including the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, Midland Orchestra, Penfield Symphony Orchestras, Syracuse Symphony, and the New World Symphony Orchestra. Dr. Cox has performed with numerous international performers including Wynton Marsalis, James Galway, Shera Sherkaski, J. J. Johnson, and Max Roach. Dr. Cox is music coordinator of the Falcone Executive Board. Dr. Cox is also a Yamaha Artist and Clinician.

DR. EARLE LOUDER is retired distinguished professor emeritus of euphonium and tuba from Morehead State University, Kentucky, where he also served as resident artist for 27 years. Before his tenure at Morehead State, he was for 12 seasons principal and featured euphonium soloist and head of the brass department of "The World Famous United States Navy Band", Washington, D.C., and he conducted the Navy Band Ceremonial Unit. Before his service with the Navy Band, he was principal euphonium and assistant conductor of the 46th Infantry Div. Band of the Michigan State National Guard.

His education includes an undergraduate degree from Michigan State University, studying under the renowned euphonium artist Leonard V. Falcone. His doctoral work was completed at Florida State University from which he holds the distinction of being the first to complete the doctor of music degree in euphonium performance.

Dr. Louder is in great demand as a guest euphonium soloist, clinician, adjudicator, and conductor in the United States and internationally. He is a permanent faculty member at the Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp in Michigan.

PHILIP SINDER is professor of tuba and euphonium at the Michigan State University College of Music. His students are found in performance and teaching positions throughout the United States and have won awards in numerous competitions. Sinder has performed with many leading ensembles, including the Detroit Symphony, Chicago Symphony, St. Louis Symphony, and Houston Symphony. He is a founding member of the Brass Band of Battle Creek and also performs frequently with the Lansing Symphony and the Beaumont Brass Quintet of MSU. His solo tuba recording "Aerodynamics" has received strong critical acclaim, and he has performed on over 20 other ensemble recordings. Sinder served as an associate editor for the "New Tuba Source Book" (2006), published by Indiana University Press. He currently serves as chairman for the Leonard Falcone International Euphonium and Tuba Festival. Sinder earned a bachelor of music degree and performer's certificate from the Eastman School of Music and a master of music degree from Wichita State University.

DR. DEANNA SWOBODA teaches tuba and euphonium at Western Michigan University and performs with the Western Brass Quintet. She previously taught at the University of Nevada Las Vegas and Las Vegas Arts Academy as well as at the University of Northern Iowa, University of Denver, University of Idaho, National Conservatory of Madrid (Spain), and Deutschen Tubaforum–Hammelberg (Germany).

In 2000, she joined the Dallas Brass, a 6-piece ensemble that travels the United States and Europe presenting approximately 100 concerts per year working extensively in the public schools and at colleges and universities. She has also performed with the Denver Brass, Cedar Rapids (Iowa) Symphony, Symphony of the West Valley (Arizona), and Washington/Idaho Symphony. She is creator and performer of a motivational recruiting presentation and music workshop called "Brass Rap!" and founder of the University of Oklahoma's International Tuba/ Euphonium Summer Workshop, which has been held annually since 1998.

As a clinician, she has appeared at the national and northwest regional MENC conventions, Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic, International Women's Brass Conference, International Tuba-Euphonium Regional Conference, and for state music educator associations in Illinois, Maine, New Jersey, Texas, and Utah. She has also made appearances on the CBS Early Morning Show – with the Dallas Brass – and National Public Radio, and was featured in the May 2004 issue of The Instrumentalist magazine and the October 2000 issue of School Band and Orchestra magazine. Dr. Swoboda is secretary of the Falcone Festival Executive Board.

DR. KELLY THOMAS was appointed tuba/euphonium instructor and director of pep bands at the University of Arizona in 2001. A native of Flagstaff, Arizona, he began his studies with R. Winston Morris at Tennessee Technological University. There he earned a bachelor of music degree in music education. He also holds a master of music degree in music education from Arizona State University, where he studied with Sam Pilafian. Kelly completed a doctor of musical arts degree at Arizona State University in 2006.

Professor Thomas participated in the famed Tennessee Tech Tuba Ensemble (TTTE), under the direction of R. Winston Morris, while at TTU. Kelly has appeared as a soloist as well as an ensemble member on the following recordings affiliated with the TTTE: Euphoniums Unlimited (Mark Records 2004), The Kings of Brass (Mark Records 2001), Tubalogy 601 (Mark Records 2000), and Unleash the Beast (Mark Records 1995). In 1995 and 2007 Kelly performed at Carnegie Hall as a soloist and ensemble member with the TTTE. Dr. Thomas has collaborated with Gunther Schuller, Adam Gorb, James Grant, Greg Danner, and David Maslanka in recent years. Dr. Thomas is an artist and clinician for Besson/Buffet Crampon.
