Dr. Leonard Falcone

1899-1985



The most consummate performing artists are able to expand the horizons of their instruments and set the standard for their generation. A subset of this group (a small number indeed) possesses the pedagogical skills to match their artistic talents. These individuals are the true leaders of the music education world, maintaining extraordinary artistic standards while touching the lives of countless young people.

Such was the case with Leonard Falcone, who served on the faculty of Michigan State University for 53 years. Dr. Falcone was one of those rare talents who combined remarkable artistic talent with natural pedagogical instinct.

Born in Roseto-Valfortore, Italy, in 1899, Dr. Falcone was a professional musician (playing in the prestigious Roseto-Valfortore Town Band) before

immigrating to America in 1915 at the age of 15. In 1927, he was appointed Director of Bands at Michigan State University, where he concurrently was Chairman of the Winds and Brass Department and Professor of Baritone Horn.

Dr. Falcone was truly a world-class brass player, and his reputation for excellence touched all aspects of his career. His solo performances, his bands, and his students were all characterized by his singular dedication to the highest standards.

Dr. Falcone retired as Director of Bands at MSU in 1967, although his teaching relationship with MSU continued. During the course of his tenure as Director, Falcone's original single 65-piece Military Band developed into four units: the 175-piece Marching Band, the 115-piece Concert Band, the 100-piece Activity Band, and the Spartan Brass. In recognition of his distinguished career, the University awarded Dr. Falcone the Doctor of Fine Arts degree in 1978, marking 50 years of involvement with MSU. He retained his position as Professor of Baritone Horn until his death in 1985. In 2014, the MSU Alumni Band honored Dr. Falcone with a bronze plaque bearing his image and story, placed in the College of Music.

Dr. Falcone was active in the program of Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp since it opened in 1966. As a guest conductor and honorary trustee, Dr. Falcone helped Blue Lake become what former Michigan Governor William Milliken considered to be "one of the state's greatest cultural assets."

It was in honor of his exemplary musical and educational accomplishments that a number of Falcone students, in cooperation with Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp, established the Leonard Falcone International Euphonium Festival (now Euphonium and Tuba Festival). The Festival has become a continuing testimony to Dr. Falcone's profound influence upon the lives of his students and the extraordinary artistry he achieved on the instrument he loved.



About the Festival

Festival Objectives

During its 31 consecutive years, the Festival has gained recognition as the premier event of its kind. Objectives include:

- A promoting the highest level of artistry on the euphonium and tuba;
- A encouraging young musicians to study the euphonium and tuba;
- A enhancing the repertoire for the euphonium and tuba by commissioning and encouraging original compositions, transcriptions, and arrangements;
- st presenting master classes and performances by distinguished euphonium and tuba artists; and
- a fostering increased awareness and appreciation for euphonium and tuba by the general public.

Student and artist level competitions remain integral to the Festival. The competition has a truly international flavor, with contestants attending from countries around the world. We have awarded nearly \$265,000 in prize money in our first 30 years. Competition cash prizes are underwritten by foundations, companies, and friends who believe in the values of the Festival.

Competitor Eligibility Artist Eligibility

Participants must not be a full-time paid professional in either a performance position or a college teaching position at the time of the competition. There is no age limitation, and participants may be of any sex, race, or nationality.

Student Eligibility

There is an age limit for the student divisions. Participants must not have reached their 20th birthday prior to December 1 of the Festival year. For the 2016 Festival, applicants born BEFORE December 1, 1996, must apply in the artist divisions. Participants may be of any sex, race, or nationality. Previous first place winners of the *Student Level Competition* must enter the *Artist Level* should they compete in ensuing years.

Competition Process

Preliminary Round

Applicants submit an audio recording of the preliminary round music as specified, with no identifying information. Preliminary round adjudicators listen to and rate the recordings for selection of Festival participants.

Semi-Final Rounds

Participants prepare required music, both accompanied and unaccompanied pieces. Festival adjudicators listen to and rate the performances at the Festival, but competitors are identified by letters, not by name. Performances are NOT open to the public.

Final Round

Finalist competitors are announced at the Sunday luncheon and have until the following day to polish and rehearse. All Festival adjudicators rate the final round competitors. The public is invited to all final performances.

Guest Artist

Alessandro Fossi



Alessandro Fossi is an active Italian tuba soloist and passionate brass pedagogue renowned worldwide. He is regularly invited to important festivals and universities as guest teacher and performer, including: Curtis Institute of Philadelphia, Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique et de Danse de Paris, Royal Northern College in Manchester, Stanford University, Northwestern University, Indiana University, Conservatoire Supérieur de Musique de Genève, and Manhattan School of Music.

Fossi has performed with many of the most important Orchestras in Italy and Europe, such as the Teatro alla Scala Orchestra, the Russian National Orchestra, the Marjinski Theatre Orchestra of Saint Petersburg, the Mahler Chamber Orchestra, and Orchestra Mozart. He covers the principal Tuba position with Teatro San Carlo Orchestra in Napoli and Orchestra dell'Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia in Roma; since 2010 he has served as principal guest tuba with Teatro Comunale di Bologna Orchestra.

He has won prizes in the Markneukirchen International Competition in 2000 (World Federation of International Music Competition, Geneve) and the Lieksa International Tuba Competition in 2001. And on June 2012 he was awarded the Premio Vallesina prize for music, under the high patronage of the President of the Italian Republic.

Fossi is a member of the International Tuba Euphonium Association (ITEA) where he serves as editorial advisor and writes articles and interviews for the ITEA Journal. He has participated with solo performances and master classes in all the International Tuba Euphonium Conferences (ITEC) since 2004. For ITEA 2016, he participated as a member of the awards committee of the Roger Bobo Awards for Excellence in Recording.

Fossi can be heard in several recordings with Orchestra dell'Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia, Orchestra Filarmonica della Scala, Gomalan Brass Quintet, Orchestra del Teatro Comunale di Bologna, and Orchestra Mozart. In 2009 he produced his first solo recording entitled "Bel Canto", which collects highlights from Italian operas and classical masterworks.

Fossi is a Buffet Group Ambassador and an official endorser for B&S and Melton Meinl Weston. He currently teaches tuba at Conservatorio "C. Monteverdi" in Bolzano, Italy.



Festival Adjudicators



MSGT. NEAL CORWELL (Ret.) served as euphoniumist with the US Army Band (Pershing's Own) in Washington, DC, from 1981 to 1989. During those years, he was one of the band's most popular soloists and was featured at many prestigious events and venues. After briefly serving as principal

euphonium with the 257th Army National Guard Band (Washington, DC) during 2001, Neal rejoined Pershing's Own in 2002 where he served as euphonium section leader of the Ceremonial Band until he retired in 2016. As a civilian from 1989 to 2001, Corwell taught at Shepherd and Frostburg State Universities and earned a doctoral degree in euphonium performance and pedagogy at the University of Maryland studying with Dr. Brian Bowman. Throughout his career, Corwell has been a freelance soloist, composer, adjudicator, and recording artist. Since 1990 he has been trombonist with the St. James Brass Quintet.



DR. MARK COX, professor of tuba and euphonium at Central Michigan University, holds bachelor of music and doctor of musical arts degrees in performance from the Eastman School of Music, and a master of music degree in performance from Northwestern University. Cox has

performed major concert halls in the US, Germany, and Japan and has performed with numerous international performers. He gives seminars on teaching, performing, including *Proper Breathing Techniques for Musicians*, throughout the US. Cox's students include public school teachers and professional performers. His former students have won the Yamaha Young Artists Competition; placed in the artist division of the Leonard Falcone International Competition; are members of "Pershing's Own" US Army Band; and have performed as soloists around the nation. Mark Cox is a Yamaha Artist.



MARTY ERICKSON served under six Navy Band leaders and seven presidents during his 26 years as principal tubist and tuba soloist with the US Navy Band. Equally comfortable performing jazz, pops, and the classics and at home in any venue from symphony orchestra to Dixieland band, Erickson has established

himself as one of the most versatile tubists in the world. He has performed as soloist and clinician throughout the UK, Western Europe, Japan, Scandinavia, Greece, Spain, Bermuda, Puerto Rico, and 48 of the 50 United States. He presently teaches tuba and euphonium at the Lawrence University Conservatory of Music in Appleton, WI. Erickson is a clinician and design consultant for Getzen/Willson. He performs on Willson model 3400S **b** tuba, the 3100S BB **b** tuba and the Erickson Signature model ME1 mouthpiece. Erickson currently serves as president of ITEA.

DR. JAMIE LIPTON is associate professor of low brass at Henderson State University in Arkadelphia, Arkansas. She has performed throughout the United States, Europe, and Japan, as well as at the last five ITEA conferences. Lipton has won first place in both the Falcone Euphonium Artist and ITEC

Euphonium Artist competitions. She has been on faculty at many of the leading American brass workshops. Currently, Lipton directs and performs with several brass ensembles and is principal euphonium in the Natural State Brass Band based in Little Rock, Arkansas. She holds degrees from Northwestern University (Evanston, IL) and the University of North Texas, and her major professors include Rex Martin, Dr. Brian Bowman, and the late Dr. Vern Kagarice. Lipton is a Willson performing artist.



DR. EARLE LOUDER is retired distinguished professor emeritus of euphonium and tuba from Morehead State University, Kentucky, where he also served as resident-artist for 27 years. Before his tenure at Morehead State, he was for 12 seasons principal and featured euphonium

soloist and head of the brass department of the US Navy Band, and he conducted the Navy Band Ceremonial Unit. Louder was a student of Leonard Falcone, and was the first person to complete the doctor of music degree in euphonium performance at Florida State University. He is a permanent faculty member at the Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp in Michigan. Louder is in great demand as a guest euphonium soloist, clinician, adjudicator, and conductor in the US and internationally. Acclaimed as one of the finest euphonium virtuosos of all time, Louder performs on three low brass instruments – trombone, tuba, and euphonium.



PHILIP SINDER is professor of tuba and euphonium at Michigan State University. His students are found in performance and teaching positions throughout the United States and have won awards in numerous competitions. Sinder has performed with many leading ensembles, including the

Detroit Symphony, Chicago Symphony, St. Louis Symphony, and Houston Symphony. He is a founding member of the Brass Band of Battle Creek and also performs frequently with the Lansing Symphony and the MSU Beaumont Brass Quintet. His solo tuba recording Aerodynamics has received strong critical acclaim, and he has performed on over 20 other ensemble recordings. Sinder served as an associate editor for the New Tuba Source Book (2006), published by Indiana University Press. Sinder earned a bachelor of music and performer's certificate from the Eastman School of Music (Rochester, NY) and a master of music from Wichita (KS) State University.



DR. GARY SULLIVAN held music faculty positions at Ohio Northern University, Adrian College, and North Branch Schools before serving twenty-seven years as director of bands for the Charlotte, MI, public schools. He is the current artistic

director and conductor of the Lansing Concert Band. In addition to conducting, he continues to compose, teach privately, and adjudicate. Sullivan is a former euphonium student of Leonard Falcone and has also studied low brass with Thomas Clay, H. Dennis Smith, and Phil Sinder. He holds a doctor of musical arts degree from Michigan State University, a master of music degree in theory and composition from Miami University, a bachelor of music degree in instrumental music and theory from Michigan State University, and has completed additional graduate work in conducting and low brass performance at the University of Michigan.



RANDY WESTMORELAND is the instructor of tuba and euphonium at Hillsdale and Alma Colleges, where he also teaches chamber music and brass pedagogy He also serves as principal tubist with the Motor City Symphony and Saginaw Bay Symphony, and he has performed with several professional

ensembles throughout the Midwest, including the Toledo Symphony, the Musicians of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, the Detroit Chamber Winds, and the Lansing Symphony Orchestra. Westmoreland has a bachelor of music education degree from Michigan State University and a master of music degree from the University of Notre Dame.



DR. JERRY YOUNG will be judging at this year's Festival, filling in for MARTY ERICKSON, who is unable to attend. Dr. Young is professor emeritus of music at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire. Previously, he was on faculty at University of Illinois, Central Missouri State University, and Interlochen Arts Camp. At UWEC, he taught applied tuba and euphonium, the euphonium/tuba ensemble, advanced courses in music education, the honors colloquium, and supervised student teachers. Current past-president of the International Tuba/Euphonium Association (ITEA), he has also served as editor-in-chief of the ITEA Journal. In 2010 he received the initial ITEA Clifford Bevan Award for life-long accomplishment in scholarly research. Dr. Young has been proud to serve as a member of the Falcone Festival Board for nearly thirty years.
