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3..... About Dr. Leonard Falcone

Dr. Leonard Falcone 1899-1985



The most consummate performing artists are able to expand the horizons of their instruments and set the standard for their generation. A subset of this group (a small number indeed) possesses the pedagogical skills to match their artistic talents. These individuals are the true leaders of the music education world, maintaining extraordinary artistic standards while touching the lives of countless young people.

Such was the case with Leonard Falcone, who served on the faculty of Michigan State University for 53 years. Dr. Falcone was one of those rare talents who combined remarkable artistic talent with natural pedagogical instinct.

Born in Roseto-Valfortore, Italy, in 1899, Dr. Falcone was a professional musician (playing in the prestigious Roseto-Valfortore Town Band) before

immigrating to America in 1915 at the age of 15. In 1927, he was appointed Director of Bands at Michigan State University, where he concurrently was Chairman of the Winds and Brass Department and Professor of Baritone Horn.

Dr. Falcone was truly a world-class brass player, and his reputation for excellence touched all aspects of his career. His solo performances, his bands, and his students were all characterized by his singular dedication to the highest standards.

Dr. Falcone retired as Director of Bands at MSU in 1967, although his teaching relationship with MSU continued. During the course of his tenure as Director, Falcone's original single 65-piece Military Band developed into four units: the 175-piece Marching Band, the 115-piece Concert Band, the 100-piece Activity Band, and the Spartan Brass. In recognition of his distinguished career, the University awarded Leonard Falcone the Doctor of Fine Arts degree in 1978, marking 50 years of involvement with MSU. He retained his position as Professor of Baritone Horn until his death in 1985. In 2014, the MSU Alumni Band honored Dr. Falcone with a bronze plaque bearing his image and story, placed in the College of Music.

Dr. Falcone was active in the program of Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp since it opened in 1966. As a guest conductor and honorary trustee, Dr. Falcone helped Blue Lake become what former Michigan Governor William Milliken considered to be "one of the state's greatest cultural assets."

It was in honor of his exemplary musical and educational accomplishments that a number of Falcone students, in cooperation with Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp, established the Leonard Falcone International Euphonium Festival (now Euphonium and Tuba Festival). The Festival has become a continuing testimony to Dr. Falcone's profound influence upon the lives of his students and the extraordinary artistry he achieved on the instrument he loved.

About the Festival

Festival Objectives

The Leonard Falcone International Euphonium & Tuba Festival has gained recognition as the premier event of its kind. Our objectives include:

- A promoting the highest level of artistry on the euphonium and tuba;
- A encouraging young musicians to study the euphonium and tuba;
- A enhancing the repertoire for the euphonium and tuba by commissioning and encouraging original compositions, transcriptions, and arrangements;
- A presenting master classes and performances by distinguished euphonium and tuba artists; and
- a fostering increased awareness and appreciation for euphonium and tuba by the general public.

Student and artist level competitions remain integral to the Festival. The competition has a truly international flavor, with contestants attending from countries around the world. We have awarded more than \$275,000 in prize money since this competition began. Competition cash prizes are underwritten by foundations, companies, and friends who believe in the values of the Festival.

Competitor Eligibility Artist Eligibility

Participants must not be a full-time paid professional in either a performance position or a college teaching position at the time of the competition. There is no age limitation, and participants may be of any sex, race, or nationality.

Competition Process Preliminary Round

Applicants submit an audio recording of the preliminary round music as specified, with no identifying information. Preliminary round adjudicators listen to and rate the recordings for selection of Festival participants.

Student Eligibility

There is an age limit for the student divisions. Participants must not have reached their 20th birthday prior to December 1 of the Festival year. For the 2017 Festival, applicants born BEFORE December 1, 1997, must apply in the artist divisions. Participants may be of any sex, race, or nationality. Previous first place winners of the *Student Level Competition* must enter the *Artist Level* should they compete in ensuing years.

Semi-Final Rounds

Participants prepare required music, both accompanied and unaccompanied pieces. Festival adjudicators listen to and rate the performances at the Festival, but competitors are screened from the judges and identified by letters, not by name. Performances are NOT open to the public.

Final Round

Finalist competitors are announced at the Sunday luncheon and have until the following day to polish and rehearse. All Festival adjudicators rate the final round competitors. The public is invited to all final performances.

Guest Artists

DR. GAIL ROBERTSON (left) serves as Assistant Professor of Tuba and Euphonium/Jazz at the University of Central Arkansas. She earned her BA degree from the University of Central Florida and a MM in Euphonium Performance from Indiana University while serving as graduate assistant to Harvey Phillips and completed her DMA as a University Distin-



guished Fellow at Michigan State University studying with Phil Sinder, Ava Ordman, and Ricardo Lorenz.

She has taught on the faculties of Eastern Michigan University, the University of Central Florida, Bethune-Cookman University, the University of Florida, and remains active as a teacher, adjudicator, composer, arranger and free-lance artist, both nationally and internationally.

Robertson was just elected Vice President/President Elect of the International Tuba and Euphonium Association (ITEA) and is active with several other groups including the Falcone Festival Board.

She has served as a clinician nation-wide and has toured as a performer and featured soloist in the US, Europe, China, and Japan with various ensembles. As a Willson Euphonium Artist, Robertson's euphonium of choice is a Willson 2950TA with a bronze Warburton/Gail Robertson mouthpiece. DR. STACY BAKER (right) earned the academic rank of Professor of Music-Tuba/ Euphonium and has been honored as the 2016-2017 Distinguished Creative Productions Award recipient and the 2014-2015 Distinguished Teacher at Morehead State University in Morehead, Kentucky, where she has taught since 1996.

Originally from Harsen's Island, Michigan, she received both her MM and BM degrees from the University of Michigan where she graduated summa cum laude as a James B. Angell Scholar. She holds a DMA in Performance and Literature with highest honors from the University of Illinois.

Baker enjoys an active performing career appearing as featured artist at many national and international conferences and festivals. She has toured and recorded throughout the United States, Europe, and China as soloist and with a variety of ensembles. She has also performed as principal tubist with several symphony orchestras.

Baker has served as co-editor of the International Women's Brass Conference Newsletter and on the IWBC Board of Directors. Her teachers include Jeff Funderburk, Wes Jacobs, Tommy Johnson, Fritz Kaenzig, and Mark Moore

SYMBIOSISDUO was formed in 2007 to increase awareness of the tuba/euphonium duo as a performance medium and to promote and disseminate new works for this unique combination of instruments. The duo chose their name from the concert duet of that name written for them by composer Chris Sharp. SYM**BIOSIS**DUO highlights the artistic achievements of two of the most accomplished women regionally, nationally, and internationally in the field of low brass performance and pedagogy. The euphonium and the tuba voices are valued as co-equal voices. THOMAS BROKA is retired as coordinator of music for the Bay City (MI) Public Schools. He also taught in Michigan at the Brighton Area Schools and at Haslett Public Schools. A graduate of Central Michigan University and Michigan State University, he has

served with the Falcone Festival for more than 20 years, many of them as vice president of the board. Active as a tuba and euphonium player, Broka performs with several community bands and is a former member of the Brass Band of Battle Creek.



DR. CHRIS COMBEST is Assistant Professor of Tuba at Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro, where he teaches tuba and music theory and performs with the MTSU Faculty Brass Quintet. Prior to joining the faculty at

MTSU, Combest held teaching positions at the University of Texas-San Antonio, Southern Illinois University, and the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Principal Tubist with the Wintergreen Festival Orchestra and former tubist with the Louisville Orchestra, Combest has performed with the Indianapolis Symphony, San Antonio Symphony, the US Army Field Band, Dallas Wind Symphony, Lexington Philharmonic, Illinois Symphony, Chattanooga Symphony, Huntsville Symphony, and various artists including film composer John Williams, Audra McDonald, and the Canadian Brass. He appears on recordings for National Public Radio, the BBC, and Disney and can also be heard on the Polyphonic and Albany music labels. Combest is a Buffet Performing Artist for Melton Meinl Weston instruments.



DR. MARK COX, professor of tuba and euphonium at Central Michigan University, holds bachelor of music and doctor of musical arts degrees in performance from the Eastman School of Music, and a master of music degree in performance from Northwestern

University. Cox has performed at major concert halls in

the US, Germany, and Japan and has performed with numerous international performers. He gives seminars on teaching, performing, including *Proper Breathing Techniques for Musicians*, throughout the US. Cox's students include public school teachers and professional performers. His former students have won the Yamaha Young Artists Competition; placed in the artist division of the Leonard Falcone International Competition; are members of "Pershing's Own" US Army Band; and have performed as soloists around the nation. Mark Cox is a Yamaha Artist.



DR. JAMIE LIPTON is associate professor of low brass at Henderson State University in Arkadelphia, Arkansas. She has performed throughout the United States, Europe, and Japan, as well as at the last five ITEA conferences. Lipton has won first place in both the

Falcone Euphonium Artist and ITEC Euphonium Artist competitions. She has been on faculty at many of the leading American brass workshops. Currently, Lipton directs and performs with several brass ensembles and is principal euphonium in the Natural State Brass Band based in Little Rock, Arkansas. She holds degrees from Northwestern University (Evanston, IL) and the University of North Texas, and her major professors include Rex Martin, Dr. Brian Bowman, and the late Dr. Vern Kagarice. Lipton is a Willson performing artist.



DR. EARLE LOUDER is retired distinguished professor emeritus of euphonium and tuba from Morehead State University, Kentucky, where he also served as resident-artist for 27 years. Before his tenure at Morehead State, he was for 12 seasons principal and featured

euphonium soloist and head of the brass department of the US Navy Band, and he conducted the Navy Band Ceremonial Unit. Louder was a student of Leonard Falcone, and was the first person to complete the doctor of music degree in euphonium performance at Florida State University. He is a permanent faculty member at the Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp in Michigan. Louder is in great demand as a guest euphonium soloist, clinician, adjudicator, and conductor in the US and internationally. Acclaimed as one of the finest euphonium virtuosos of all time, Louder performs on three low brass instruments – trombone, tuba, and euphonium.



DONALD PALMIRE recently retired from the Army with a total of 30 years of service. He has been an active euphonium soloist, clinician, and educator for more than thirty years. He began his career as a euphoniumist with the Marine Corps Recruit Depot Band at

Parris Island, SC, in 1980 and served as euphoniumist with "The President's Own" United States Marine Band from 1987-1991. He was a euphoniumist and soloist with the Dallas Wind Symphony from 1992-1994 and is the retired Principal Euphonium with "Pershing's Own" United States Army Band and has also performed with many military bands and symphony orchestras. Palmire attended Florida Community College and the University of South Florida and earned a Master of Music in Church Music from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, TX. Palmire is an XO Professional Brass Artist and performs exclusively on the XO 1270 euphonium.

PHILIP SINDER is professor of tuba and euphonium at Michigan State University whose students are found in performance and teaching positions throughout the US and have won awards in numerous performance competitions. Sinder has performed with ensembles

such as the Detroit, Chicago, St. Louis, and Houston Symphonies and the Mariinsky Orchestra. He is a founding member of the Brass Band of Battle Creek, and performs frequently with the Lansing Symphony, Michigan Opera Theatre, and the MSU Beaumont Brass Quintet. His solo tuba recording, "Aerodynamics", has received strong critical acclaim and he has performed on over 20 ensemble recordings. In 2009, Sinder was awarded MSU's Withrow Excellence in Teaching Award and in 2017 he received ITEA's Excellence in Teaching Award. He currently serves as chairman for the Leonard Falcone International Euphonium and Tuba Festival, and since 2005 has been a Valade Teaching Fellow at Interlochen Arts Camp.
