he most consummate performing artists are able to expand the horizons of instruments and set the standard for their generation. A subset of this group (this is a small number indeed) pedagogical skills possesses match their artistic talents. These individuals are the true leaders of the music education world, who maintain extraordinary artistic standards while touching the lives of countless young people.



Such was the case with Leonard Falcone, who served on the faculty of Michigan State University for 53 years. Dr. Falcone was one of those rare talents who combined remarkable artistic talent with natural pedagogical instinct.

Dr. Falcone was born in 1899 in Roseto-Valfortore in southeastern Italy, about 75 miles northeast of Naples. He was a professional musician (playing in the prestigious Roseto-Valfortore Town Band) before immigrating to America in 1915 at the age of 15. In 1927, he was appointed Director of Bands at Michigan State University, where he concurrently was Chairman of the Winds and Brass Department and Professor of Baritone Horn.

Dr. Falcone was truly a world-class brass player, and his reputation for excellence touched all aspects of his career. His solo performances, his bands, and his students were all characterized by his singular dedication to the highest standards.

Dr. Falcone retired as Director of Bands at MSU in 1967, although his teaching relationship with MSU continued. During the course of his tenure as Director of Bands,

Leonard Falcone's original single 65piece Military Band developed into four units: the 175-piece Marching Band, the 115-piece Concert Band, the 100-piece Activity Band, and the Spartan Brass. In recognition of his distinguished career, the University awarded Leonard Falcone the Doctor of Fine Arts degree in 1978, marking 50 years of involvement with MSU. He retained his position as Professor of Baritone Horn until his death in 1985. In 2014, the MSU Alumni Band

honored Dr. Falcone with a bronze plaque bearing his image and story, placed in the College of Music.

Dr. Falcone was active in the program of Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp since it opened in 1966. As a guest conductor and honorary trustee, Dr. Falcone helped Blue Lake become what former Michigan Governor William Milliken considered to be "one of the state's greatest cultural assets."

It was in honor of his exemplary musical and educational accomplishments that a number of Falcone students, in cooperation with Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp, established the Leonard Falcone International Euphonium Festival (now Euphonium and Tuba Festival). The Festival has become a continuing testimony to Dr. Falcone's profound influence upon the lives of his students and the extraordinary artistry he achieved on the instrument he loved.

About the Festival

Festival Objectives

The Leonard Falcone International Euphonium & Tuba Festival has gained recognition as the premier event of its kind. Our objectives include:

- **a** promoting the highest level of artistry on the euphonium and tuba;
- **a** encouraging young musicians to study the euphonium and tuba;
- **a** enhancing the repertoire for the euphonium and tuba by commissioning and encouraging original compositions, transcriptions, and arrangements;
- 🛦 presenting master classes and performances by distinguished euphonium and tuba artists; and
- **a** fostering increased awareness and appreciation for euphonium and tuba by the general public.

Student and artist level competitions remain integral to the Festival. The competition has a truly international flavor, with contestants attending from countries around the world. We have awarded more than \$300,000 in prize money since this competition began. Competition cash prizes are underwritten by foundations, companies, and friends who believe in the values of the Festival.

Competitor Eligibility

Artist Eligibility

Participants must not currently be or formerly been a full-time paid professional in either a performance position or a college teaching position as of August 1 of the Festival year. There is no age limitation, and participants may be of any sex, race, or nationality.

Student Eligibility

There is an age limit for the student divisions. Participants must not have reached their 20th birthday prior to December 1 of the Festival year. For the 2020 Festival, a participant who will be 20 years old or older on December 1, 2020, is not eligible to apply in either student division. Participants may be of any sex, race, or nationality. Previous first place winners of the *Student Level Competition* must enter the *Artist Level* should they compete in ensuing years.

Competition Process

For Festivals as held at Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp 2019 and previous years:

Preliminary Round

Applicants submit an audio recording of the preliminary round music as specified, with no identifying information.

Preliminary round adjudicators listen to and rate the recordings for selection of Festival participants.

Semi-Final Rounds

Participants prepare required music, both accompanied and unaccompanied pieces. Festival adjudicators listen to and rate the performances at the Festival, but competitors are identified by letters, not by name. Performances are NOT open to the public.

Final Round

Finalist competitors are announced at the Sunday luncheon and have until the following day to polish and rehearse. All Festival adjudicators rate the final round competitors. The public is invited to all final performances.

The 2020 Virtual Festival Competition follows the same process with these changes:

Preliminary Round: All applicants submit their recording with or without piano accompaniment.

All semi-finalists and alternates submit video performances of all required music for both the unaccompanied and the accompanied semi-final rounds and the final round, due August 4. There will be no accompaniment on any of the recordings.

Semi-Final Rounds: Festival adjudicators listen to and rate the audio portion of the recordings. Finalists are announced at the end of the day Saturday.

Final Round: The finalists' video recordings are presented to all Festival adjudicators to rank; the public is invited to watch the performances on our Facebook live stream. Medalists are announced at the end of the day Sunday.

Journey to the 2020 VIRTUAL Festival



Although the COVID-19 coronavirus was first detected in 2019, it was not until the early months of 2020 that its impact on the world became evident. By mid-March, most U.S. grade schools, high schools, colleges, and universities dismissed their students from their campuses to stay at home and attend classes on-line. In what seemed a blink of an eye, life here turned upside down. Mothers, fathers, and students were working and studying at home.

This disruption to "normal" life had an impact on everything, including the Falcone Festival. Students lost the resources ordinarily available to them—no pianists to rehearse and record with, limited or no recording facilities outside their homes and, for some, loss of school-owned instruments. Add to that the difficulties of those in apartments who had to juggle times to rehearse while accommodating schedules of those in apartments around them—people who are working from home or perhaps working nights and needing to sleep during daylight hours. Certainly, a challenge!

The Falcone Festival Board's first announcement regarding the COVID-19 coronavirus pandemic came on March 15, detailing changes to the preliminary application requirements for the 2020 Festival. The deadline was extended from March 31 to April 30, 2020, giving applicants an extra month to complete recordings and submit materials. In addition, the piano accompaniment requirement was waived; the required repertoire remained the same as originally posted for 2020 but allowed applicants to choose to submit with or without piano accompaniment.

On April 13, Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp announced it was suspending all camp activities for 2020. This meant that the Festival could not be held there. The board considered options and decided they were unlikely to find another venue for August. Moving the Festival to a later date (December 2020 or January 2021) was problematic because of the uncertainties about contagion and peoples' schedules.

That left the board to decide whether we could present a virtual festival up to our standards or whether we should simply cancel the 2020 Festival. We announced our compromise on April 24: we would hold a festival, even though we weren't sure exactly what it might look like, and we would try to keep as many signature aspects of a "normal" festival as we could.

When we reached our (new) deadline for applications on April 30, we found ourselves with a robust pool of applicants in all four divisions. Our belief that players would remain interested in applying was justified! On May 15, the board announced that the 2020 Falcone Festival was going virtual. So...



Solo Works Competition 2020 Winners

Unaccompanied Solo Euphonium In Modo Humano by Thomas Rüedi

Thomas Rüedi is a Swiss-born international euphonium artist, music educator, composer, and arranger. His solo engagements have led him throughout Europe, Africa, Asia, South America, and the United States. Rüedi is professor of euphonium and chamber music at Bern University of the Arts and Lucerne University of the Arts; as a guest professor he regularly gives masterclasses throughout Europe and overseas. He is also an acclaimed arranger and composer, supporting the further development and enrichment of the euphonium repertoire—in particular, music for younger players.



PROGRAM NOTES: In Modo Humano (In A Human Way) is set out to explore some of the characteristics which mostly define us as who we are, as human beings. The first movement, "La Fantasia" (Fantasy), plays with the imagination and creativity through the means of different sound colors, textures, and motions. The spirit is calm and thoughtful, but also has a sense of daring optimism through trying out different ideas. The second movement, "La gioia" (Joy), explores the feeling of great pleasure and happiness; in the middle section, Beethoven sends his regards with a quote from the Pastoral Symphony, entitled Scene by the Bank of a Stream. The third movement, "L'amore" (Love), freely follows the feeling of warm personal attachment or deep affection, as for a parent, child, or friend; the music flows gently in the form of a Sicilienne. The fourth movement, "La curiosità" (Curiosity), plays with the characteristics of inquisitiveness — the desire to learn or know about anything!



Unaccompanied Solo Tuba Climate Strike by Evan Zegiel

Evan Zegiel is an active tubist, composer, and brass educator. He frequently performs across Southeast Michigan and has played with the Baltimore (MD) and Charlotte (NC) Symphonies. Zegiel performs regularly in chamber music settings and is co-founder, with Anthony DeMartinis, of BrassTaps Duo, a tuba and percussion duo which has commissioned multiple works by student and professional composers to expand the available repertoire for both instruments. Zegiel is also an active composer, currently studying at Michigan State University. Zegiel won first place in the

Falcone Festival Tuba Student (2013) and Tuba Artist (2017) divisions

PROGRAM NOTES: Climate Strike is structured in three roughly through-composed movements, each one reflecting an issue related to the changing climate of our world. The first movement reflects the most recent and devastating brush fires all over Australia, and presents the performer with challenging rhythmic motives which are developed in unexpected ways, representing the unpredictable nature of the sparking embers which ignite brush fires. The second movement meditates on the reality of the melting glaciers at the poles of the Earth, the consequent loss of habitat for arctic creatures, and the rising sea levels in coastal regions; the indication for an unstable tempo at the beginning should be taken literally throughout the movement. The final movement, Super-Hurricane, imagines the possibility of intense, world-changing storms in the future; the musical gestures resemble gusting winds. The reality of climate change will have dire consequences for all the species of the world unless decisive action is taken by humanity at every level of society. I was inspired to write this work after watching and reading of the recent climate change protests taking place in various parts of the world by schoolchildren.

The Falcone Festival held the 2020 Solo Works Competition to commemorate our 35th anniversary. These two winning pieces, performed by their composers, are included in the 2020 Festival and will be included in the required repertoire list for the 2021 Festival student division competitions. Honorable Mention winners are: "Modal Suite"* by Kayla Danielle Roth & "Subject to Change" by Andrew P. Markel (euphonium) and "The Mechanicals"* by Edmund Joliffe and "Whale Songs"* by Lynn Blake John (tuba).

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
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
