Dr. Leonard Falcone 1899-1985

The most consummate performing artists are able to expand the horizons of their instruments and set the standard for their generation. A subset of this group (a small number indeed) possesses pedagogical skills to match their artistic talents. These individuals are the true leaders of the music education world, who maintain extraordinary artistic standards while touching the lives of countless young poople



of countless young people.

Such was the case with Leonard Falcone, who served as Michigan State University Director of Bands for 40 years and then continued as Professor of Euphonium and Tuba until 1980. Dr. Falcone was one of those rare musicians who combined remarkable artistic talent with natural pedagogical instinct.

Dr. Falcone was born in 1899 in Roseto-Valfortore in southeastern Italy, about 75 miles northeast of Naples. He was a professional musician (playing in the prestigious Roseto-Valfortore Town Band) before immigrating to America in 1915 at the age of fifteen. In 1927, he was appointed Director of Bands at Michigan State University, where he concurrently was Chairman of the Winds and Brass Department and Professor of Baritone Horn.

Dr. Falcone was truly a world-class brass player, and his reputation for excellence touched all aspects of his career. His solo performances, his bands, and his students were all characterized by his singular dedication to the highest standards.

Dr. Falcone retired as Director of Bands at MSU in 1967, although his teaching relationship with MSU continued. During the course of his tenure as Director of Bands,

Leonard Falcone's original single 65-piece Military Band developed into four units: the 175-piece Marching Band, the 115-piece Concert Band, the 100-piece Activity Band, and the Spartan Brass. In recognition of his distinguished career, Michigan State awarded Leonard Falcone the Doctor of Fine Arts degree in 1978, marking 50 years of involvement with MSU. In 2014, the MSU Alumni Band honored Dr. Falcone with a bronze plaque bearing his image and story, placed in the College of Music.

Dr. Falcone was active in the program of Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp since it opened in 1966. As a guest conductor and honorary trustee, Dr. Falcone helped Blue Lake become what former Michigan Governor William Milliken considered to be "one of the state's greatest cultural assets."

It was in honor of his exemplary musical and educational accomplishments that a number of Falcone students, in cooperation with Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp, established the Leonard Falcone International Euphonium Festival (now Euphonium and Tuba Festival). The Festival has become a continuing testimony to Dr. Falcone's profound influence upon the lives of his students and the extraordinary artistry he achieved on the instrument he loved.

The Artistry of Leonard Falcone

About the Festival

Festival Objectives

The Leonard Falcone International Euphonium & Tuba Festival has gained recognition as the premier event of its kind. Our objectives include:

- promoting the highest level of artistry on the euphonium and tuba;
- encouraging young musicians to study the euphonium and tuba;
- enhancing the repertoire for the euphonium and tuba by commissioning and encouraging original compositions, transcriptions, and arrangements;
- ★ presenting master classes and performances by distinguished euphonium and tuba artists; and
- ★ fostering increased awareness and appreciation for euphonium and tuba by the general public.

Student and artist level competitions remain integral to the Festival. The competition has a truly international flavor, with contestants attending from countries around the world. We have awarded more than \$370,000 in prize money since this competition began. Competition cash prizes are underwritten by foundations, companies, and friends who believe in the values of the Festival.

Competitor Eligibility

Artist Eligibility

Participants must not currently be or formerly been a full-time paid professional in either a performance position or a college teaching position as of August 1 of the Festival year. There is no age limitation, and participants may be of any sex, race, or nationality.

Student Eligibility

There is an age limit for the student divisions. Participants must not have reached their 20th birthday prior to December 1 of the Festival year. For the 2024 Festival, a participant who will be 20 years old or older on December 1, 2024, is not eligible to apply in either student division. Participants may be of any sex, race, or nationality. Previous first place winners of the Student Level Competition must enter the Artist Level should they compete in ensuing years.

Applicants in Multiple Divisions

While participants may choose to apply in multiple divisions, they must choose one division in which to compete. Application fees are refunded as outlined in the Cancellation and Refund Policy.

Competition Process

Preliminary Round

Applicants submit a video recording of the preliminary round music as specified, with no identifying information. Preliminary round adjudicators listen to and rate the recordings for selection of Festival participants.

Semi-Final Rounds

Participants prepare required music, both accompanied and unaccompanied pieces. Festival adjudicators listen to and rate the performances at the Festival, but competitors are NOT identified by name. Performances are NOT open to the public.

Final Round

Finalist competitors are announced at the Sunday luncheon and have until the following day to polish and rehearse. All Festival adjudicators rate the final round competitors. The public is invited to all final performances.

Guest Artist 2024 - Dr. Bethany Wiese



Dr. Bethany Wiese is Associate Professor of Tuba and Euphonium at Vanderbilt University and Principal Tuba of the Asheville Symphony Orchestra, as well as serving as low brass faculty at the Brevard Music Center Summer Institute and Festival.

Dr. Wiese has enjoyed a diverse career performing in orchestras and other large ensembles. She spent two years as a fellow of the New World Symphony in Miami Beach, Florida. She is also a past fellow of summer programs including the Tanglewood Music Center, Aspen Music Festival and School, National Repertory Orchestra, and National Orchestral Institute, and spent one summer touring the United States with the American Wind Symphony Orchestra. She has performed with orchestras throughout the country and abroad, including the Charlotte (NC) Symphony Orchestra, Charleston Symphony, Aarhus Symphony Orchestra (Denmark), Macao Orchestra, and Korean Broadcasting Symphony Orchestra. Additionally, Dr. Wiese has

previously served as Principal E-flat Tuba in the North Carolina Brass Band (the only professional brass band in North Carolina) and has enjoyed performing with Monarch Brass, an all-female brass ensemble, at the International Women's Brass Conference and International Trumpet Guild.

Dr. Wiese has been a prizewinner in several solo competitions, including the Falcone Festival, where she was a medalist in the 2007 Tuba Artist division.

A native of Davenport, Iowa, Dr. Wiese has been invited to present masterclasses at numerous universities and conferences throughout the country and is a past recipient of the Hayes School of Music Outstanding Teaching Award at Appalachian State University in Boone, NC, where she recently served as Associate Professor of Tuba and Euphonium. She received her Doctor of Music degree from Northwestern University as a student of Rex Martin; additionally, she completed a Master of Music degree from Yale University (studying with Mike Roylance) and Bachelor of Music degree from Lawrence University (studying with Marty Erickson).

She says this about her teaching philosophy: "My teaching philosophy is simple: to help students become thoughtful musicians. Music is about communication and ultimately, we are storytellers. My goal is to help students refine the skills necessary to become compelling, creative, and clear storytellers."

2024 Festival Adjudicators



DR. MARK COX, Professor of Tuba and Euphonium at Central Michigan University, holds BM and DMA degrees in performance from the Eastman School of Music, and a MM degree in performance from Northwestern University. Dr. Cox has performed at major concert halls in the U.S., Germany, and Japan and has performed with

numerous international performers. He gives seminars on teaching and performing throughout the U.S. His students include public school teachers and professional performers and former students have won the Yamaha Young Artists Competition, placed in the artist division of the Leonard Falcone Competition, are members of the U.S. Army Band "Pershing's Own," and have performed as soloists around the U.S. Dr. Cox is a Yamaha Artist.



MARTY ERICKSON, Principal/Solo Tubist with the U.S. Navy Band for 26 years, is one of the most versatile tubists in the world. He has played in 38 countries and 48 states, has over 50 recordings plus 3 solo CDs, and had a recital at Carnegie Hall in 2013. Now Principal E-flat Tuba with the Brass Band of Battle Creek, he has played extra with the

National Symphony, the Baltimore Opera Orchestra, and the Chicago Symphony; soloed with the Boston Pops; is an associate artist with the Rodney Marsalis Philadelphia Big Brass; is Principal Tuba with the Fox Valley Symphony; and performs with the Millennium Brass. Retired from teaching at Lawrence University in Appleton, WI, Erickson is a clinician for Eastman-Shires-Willson Band Instrument Company and plays the Willson 3400S E-flat tuba he helped design. He has served as Falcone Festival Adjudicating Chairman for over 30 years.



DR. JAMIE LIPTON (she/they) is Professor of Low Brass and Director of the Brass Band and Symphony Band at Henderson State University in Arkadelphia, AR. Dr. Lipton has performed throughout the U.S. and all over the world, most recently in Brazil. A past winner of both the Falcone Euphonium Artist and the ITEC Euphonium Artist competitions,

she now serves on the Falcone Festival board and as Competition Coordinator for ITEC. Dr. Lipton has been a clinician at many leading American brass workshops and has taught euphonium at Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp since 2007. She is the euphoniumist for the touring ensemble Trio di Velluto, and she is a board member and solo euphonium of the Natural State Brass Band in Little Rock, AR.



DR. MATTHEW MIRELES is Chair of the Department of Music, Director of Bands, and Professor of Euphonium and Tuba at St. Mary's University in San Antonio, TX. Dr. Mireles has conducted and performed with groups including the U.S. Army Field Band, the Tutti World Music Festival in Beijing, China, the Military Wind Band of

Upper Austria, the World Adult Wind Orchestra Project in Schladming, Austria, and numerous other Honor Bands and ensembles in the U.S. He also serves as Music Director and Conductor of the San Antonio Brass Band and the Backburner Tuba-Euphonium Collective. Dr. Mireles is a past winner of the Falcone Euphonium Artist, Mid-Texas Symphony Young Artist, and International Tuba Euphonium Conference (ITEC) Chamber Music Competitions. His solo album *Prometheus* includes previously unrecorded works for euphonium with strings, wind ensemble, and piano, and his chamber music album with the Boreas Quartet, *The Serpent's Kiss*, was the winner of the ITEA Roger Bobo Award for Recording Excellence.



DR. MATTHEW MURCHISON enjoys a varied career as performer, composer, arranger, educator, conductor, and producer.

Dr. Murchison was a member (and frequent soloist) of Pittsburgh's River City Brass from 2002-2015. He has also performed with the U.S. Army Band "Pershing's Own," West Point Band, Brass Band of Battle Creek, Dallas

Wind Symphony, and with the orchestras of Syracuse, Delaware, and West Virginia, among others. He produces album recordings and performs on solo, chamber, large ensemble, and rock band albums. He has also been engaged to write jokes and perform as emcee for concerts. Solo albums are: *Everyone But Me, Reminiscence*, and *Songs for One and More*. His compositions have been performed across the U.S. and in Japan, South America, and Europe. Dr. Murchison is Instructor of Euphonium and Tuba at Cornell University and Lemoyne College, and is Interim Instructor of Euphonium and Tuba at Ithaca College. Dr. Murchison is a Yamaha Artist.



PHILIP SINDER is Professor of Tuba and Euphonium at the Michigan State University College of Music. His students are found in performance and teaching positions throughout the U.S. and abroad, and have won awards in numerous solo competitions. Sinder has performed with many leading ensembles, including the Detroit, Chicago,

St. Louis, and Houston Symphonies. Principal Tuba with the Lansing Symphony Orchestra since 1982, he also is a founding

member of the Brass Band of Battle Creek. He has performed on over 20 large ensemble and brass quintet recordings, as well as his solo tuba recording *Aerodynamics*. Sinder has authored publications available from Mountain Peak Music and Indiana University Press. In 2009, Sinder received the inaugural Withrow Excellence in Teaching Award at Michigan State University, and in 2017 he received the International Tuba Euphonium Association Excellence in Teaching Award. Since 2005, he has been a Valade Teaching Fellow at the Interlochen Arts Camp.



DR. WILLIAM SUTTON is currently Assistant Professor of Music at Northwest Missouri State University where he leads the Northwest Concert Band and teaches low brass and music theory. He spends his summers teaching low brass at the New England Music Camp in Sydney, Maine. Dr. Sutton has performed with the Kansas

City Symphony, Grand Rapids Symphony, Topeka Symphony, St. Joseph Symphony, Lansing Symphony, Orchestra of Northern New York, Holland Symphony, and Capital Region Wind Ensemble. He has been invited to perform and present at regional and International ITEA conferences, Nebraska Music Educators Association Conference, Midwest Clinic, and as a soloist with many College and University ensembles throughout the U.S. Dr. Sutton has attended the Leonard Falcone International Euphonium and Tuba Festival as both a competitor and adjudicator. His solo playing can be heard under the Kendor Music label.



DR. REMUS WEBB currently serves as Associate Professor of Music at Albany State University in Albany, Georgia, where he maintains the lower brass studio and teaches courses within the music department. Prior to his appointment at Albany State, Dr. Webb served on faculty at Olivet College and Lansing Community College in Michigan, and

Stillman College in Alabama. Dr. Webb has been a guest artist/clinician at the International Tuba Euphonium Conference and regional tuba-euphonium conferences, the Detroit Jazz Festival, Michigan State University, Northwest Missouri State University, Warren Concert Band, the Brass Band of Battle Creek Youth Camp, and many local and regional high schools. Dr. Webb earned his Master's degree from the University of Louisville and his Bachelor and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees from Michigan State University. His private instructors include Phil Sinder, Wycliffe Gordon, Derrick Gardner, John Jones, Dr. Ansyn Banks, and Michael Dease.

DR. MARY JO COX received her Bachelor of Music from Houghton College and her Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts in piano performance from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. Dr. Cox maintains an active schedule as soloist and chamber musician throughout the United States. She serves on the faculty of Central Michigan University, currently holds the position of principal keyboardist with the Midland (MI) Symphony Orchestra, and is a frequent collaborative pianist for festivals and competitions throughout the U.S. (Euphonium Artists & Guest Artist Recital)



DR. LING LO holds degrees from Michigan State University (DMA Piano Performance, DMA & MM Collaborative Piano), Boston University (MM Piano Performance), and Soochow University (BM Music Performance). Dr. Lo currently serves as Teaching Assistant Professor in Collaborative Piano at the University of North Dakota. Prior to that, she served as staff pianist at Texas A&M University-Kingsville and Saginaw Valley State University. Unaccompanied Solo Euphonium

Improvisations by Clément Couty (Euphonium.com)

Born in 1999, Clément Couty began his musical studies in the Clermont-Ferrand region of France before joining the prestigious National Conservatory of Lyon in 2018 in the classes of Bastien Baumet, Guillaume Dionnet and Arnaud Boukhitine. Alongside his studies, he takes part in several academies, various improvisation and musical theater projects, and performs regularly with ensembles such as the Gewandhausorchester at the Leipzig Opera, Lyon National Orchestra, Paris Brass Band, Brass Band Aeolus, and the Brass Band of Genève.

Passionate about chamber music, Couty is a founding member of the quintet Penta'Saône and the brass ensemble Abracada'Brass, in which he plays euphonium and tenorhorn. He is also an arranger and composer, and since January

2023 has held the position of tenorhorn co-solo (german system) in the orchestra of the Saxon Wind Philharmonic in Leipzig, Germany.

PROGRAM NOTES: This piece was born of the desire to bring composer and performer closer together in order to rediscover the authenticity and naturalness of playing that is often overlooked in complex written music. In fact, these three short movements emanate from improvisations, each expressing the very essence of a particular musical genre.

- The first movement, **Preludio**, is an unmeasured prelude of the kind played in the Baroque era. It refers in particular to Telemann's fantasias and Couperin's unmeasured preludes.
- The second movement, **Notturno**, is a tribute to jazz musicians. The performer can choose to use a straight mute according to the color of the sound they wish to achieve.
- The third movement, **Danza**, refers to traditional music. This is a fast movement from an imaginary folklore, largely inspired by European village dances such as the gigue or tarantella. The ternary rhythm gradually settles in, before giving way to the themes.

Indications of tempo, dynamics, articulations, and ornamentations are indicative and left to the discretion of the performer. It is important to keep in mind the improvised dimension of the work, and to make the music your own, so that you can interpret it as personally as possible. Ideally, the piece should be played by heart, so that the listener has no idea it is written music.

Tastebuds: Flavorful Vinaigrettes for Unaccompanied Tuba by Kayla Holsopple (Cimarron Music Press)

Kayla Holsopple hails from southwestern Pennsylvania as both a teacher and performer. She teaches general music and band to students from kindergarten through fifth grade at the South Allegheny School District and dedicates herself to her profession in supporting public school programs through the power of music.

As a performer, Holsopple serves as a substitute tuba player for the Altoona and Johnstown Symphonies. She was a finalist in the artist tuba division of the International Euphonium Tuba Festival. Beyond her professional commitments, she plays tuba in the Westmoreland Symphonic Winds, which allows her to connect with the broader musical community and continually refine her musicianship. Holsopple studied under Dr. Zach Collins at Indiana University of

Pennsylvania. Before then, she was a student of River City Brass baritone player Ross Cohen. Her education and mentorship have profoundly shaped her approach to both teaching and performance.

PROGRAM NOTES: This musical exploration of the sensory experience of taste has five distinct movements capturing the unique and evocative perspective on the five major taste sensations we experience in everyday life. The versatile tuba is able to play dark and sweet melodies while also being intense and flexibly virtuosic, providing the perfect vehicle to express the multifaceted experience of taste.

- I. **Umami:** This movement's slow, earthy, and contemplative beginning represents umami-rich foods such as mushrooms and aged cheeses; it then picks up to become lithe and lean to showcase the umami taste of strong seafood.
- II. **Salty:** This movement depicts a guilty pleasure snack food journey, starting with the first tastes of a freshly opened bag of chips, progressing through the temptation to sneak more even when you know you shouldn't, and concluding with the bittersweet finale of the empty bag.
- III. **Sour:** Through the use of tritones and glissandi, this movement zips through the sensation of puckered lips, capturing sharp and tangy flavors, ending with a dissatisfied swallow, leaving the listener with a lingering sense of tartness. The performer is invited to push the creative boundaries of what is on the page and find ways to make it entirely their own.
- IV. **Sweet:** This is not about average or overabundant sweetness, but rather subtly sweet things, exploring delicate flavors such as honey, fresh berries, and the richness of dark chocolate. While the 32nd notes should be played accurately and metrically, other melodies and musical ideas should be approached with rubato and a beautiful lyricism.
- V. **Bitter:** The final movement tackles the intensity of bitter drinks such as coffee and additives such as vinegar and is a confident and strong ending to a colorful and varied work. Looking closely at the movement, you will see that there is a lyrical setting noted as "adding cream and sugar," offering a moment of contrast and resolution to an otherwise impact-driven movement.

The Falcone Festival 2024 Solo Works Competition commemorated our 39th season. These two winning pieces are included in the 2024 Festival at the Adjudicators Recital and will be included in the required repertoire list for the 2025 Festival student division competitions.

As Treasurer for the Falcone Festival, Sue contributed her CPA skills in managing the financial aspects of the Festival. She has continued playing her instrument throughout her adult life. A long-time resident of the greater Lansing area and East Lansing in particular, Sue has been involved with many organizations, both as CPA and volunteer. Early in 2023 Sue experienced a medical emergency and had to step back from her responsibilities with the Festival and other involvements. During her time of recovery, she has very much appreciated all the cards, texts, phone calls, from everyone! She continues to improve her physical strength and overall health.

On Wednesday, August 16, 2023, a group of five board members were able to visit Sue Topping in East Lansing, MI, as she continued her recuperation. She was presented with an honorary gold medallion in recognition of all her contributions to the Festival over 28 years of service. Thank you, Sue!

Remembering a Good Friend: Lance LaDuke



Lance LaDuke, long-time friend of the Falcone Festival, passed away on December 10, 2023, after a tragic accident. Lance won the Euphonium Student gold medal in 1986 at the first-ever Festival and returned in 2015 as guest artist, premiering Crossroads by Brian Balmages, a piece commissioned to honor the Festival's first thirty years. He also served as a Falcone Festival adjudicator and Honorary Board member for many years.

Born in Benton Harbor, Michigan, he was a graduate of Michigan State University, earning a Bachelor's degree in music education. Before completing his graduate studies at the

University of Akron, Lance won a job playing euphonium in the United States Air Force Band in Washington DC, where he stayed from 1991 to 1995. He earned an MM degree in instrumental conducting at George Mason University while in the Air Force Band.

Maybe Lance is the best one to talk about his musical life. In his own words:

I have been very fortunate in my career to play with some amazing groups (Boston Brass, Philadelphia Orchestra, Pittsburgh Symphony, USAF Band in Washington DC, River City Brass, Brass Band of Battle Creek), with some amazing musicians (Henry Mancini, Doc Severinsen, Morgan Freeman, Imani Winds), in some amazing places (all 50 states and 30-plus countries), and have taught some amazing students (faculty positions at Carnegie Mellon University and Duquesne University and guest appearances at Juilliard, London Royal Academy of Music, Hong Kong Academy, Brazil's Tatui Conservatory and many others), and am devoted to helping the next generation of musicians (and those who teach them) in any way I can. That's a lot of parentheses. Sorry (not sorry). (source: lanceladuke.com)

As an educator, Lance was most interested in helping players figure out their own unique path to a career with the euphonium emphasizing creative and entrepreneurial thinking. In addition to his teaching at Carnegie Mellon University and his performing, he was involved in comedy improv, comedy song writing, podcasts, the Modern Musicking Center, was an XO Artist and advocate for Jupiter Band instruments, had a song headed to the moon as part of the Carnegie Mellon MoonArk project—and don't forget his love of ukuleles!

He will be missed.

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


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
